SCHOOL VISION

INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS

The building is open at 7:30 a.m. Please report to the cafeteria or an open classroom in the main building. Students may not loiter in the halls. Students who need to do make-up work or get extra help may do so before school with teacher permission.

CLOSED CAMPUS

Caribou High School has a closed campus policy. Students must stay on the campus from arrival to dismissal.

PARKING AND PARKING LOT

1. Drive slowly and carefully and do not leave the grounds unless authorized to do so.
2. Park your vehicle and immediately leave it. Do not sit in or return to parked cars during the school day.
3. Park in the designated areas. **Do not park in the gym area or behind the school.**
4. Students driving in a reckless or irresponsible manner will be remanded to the proper authorities
****Any violation may result in the loss of automobile privileges.****

ATV'S, SNOW SLEDS, AND MOTORCYCLES

ATV's, snow sleds, and motorcycles are not allowed on the campus. Violators will be remanded to the proper authorities.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Twenty (20) credits must be earned, and all graduation requirements must be met in order for a student to graduate. This includes a minimum point average of seventy (70). No student will take part in graduation exercises unless all graduation requirements are met.

CREDIT REQUIREMENT

In order to graduate, students must successfully earn a minimum of 20 credits in the following areas:

English.....	4 credits
Mathematics.....	3 credits
Science.....	3 credits

GRADE RETENTION

Students who fail English and do not make it up during summer school will not advance to the next grade level. Students must also earn the following minimum amount of credits in order to advance to the next grade:
Grade 9 -4 credits Grade 10 -9 credits Grade 11 -14 credits

COURSE LOAD

All students enrolled in the regular school program must carry a scholastic load of five (5) periods or more.

DROP PERIOD

No courses will be dropped during the school year without student/teacher/principal approval. Students may receive a grade of 60 for a course that is dropped.

HONOR ROLL

An honor roll will be compiled by the office and published at the end of each ranking period.

Highest Honors -Students who earn A's in every subject will receive Highest Honors designation.

High Honors -Students with an A average will receive High Honors Designation.

Honors -Students with a B average will receive Honors designation. Students receiving a D in any subject area will be ineligible for honor roll.

ELIGIBILITY

Students who fail two or more subjects at the quarter will be ineligible to participate in clubs, activities, and athletics for the next ranking period. A student who fails only one subject will be allowed four weeks to bring the grade up to passing.

CARIBOU HIGH SCHOOL ATTENDANCE POLICY PHILOSOPHY

Daily school attendance is one of several factors necessary for student achievement. Make-up work is never sufficient to correct for the loss of class time. The primary responsibility for a student's regular attendance rests on the shoulders of the student and the family. School personnel cannot force attendance. We can only provide an appropriate educational environment that is conducive to creating positive academic gains for each student. The rest, including maintaining high standards for punctuality and attendance, is up to the individual student and his/her parents/guardians. The entire professional staff feels strongly that a student cannot receive full benefit from the programs at Caribou High School unless he/she is in full attendance. Although the faculty realizes occasional absences from school are necessary, these instances should be kept to an absolute minimum.

ABSENCES

- A. Excused Absences Under Maine State law the only excusable absences from school are:
 1. Personal illness
 2. Appointments with health professionals that must be made during the regular school day.
 3. Observance of religious holidays when the observance is required during the school day.
 4. Family emergencies
 5. Planned absences for personal or educational purposes which have been approved. (Absences need to be **approved in advance** by submitting an Educational/ Absence Application with the attendance office.)
- B. Unexcused Absences
Students who have an unexcused absence will be required to make up all assignments and time missed from classes.
- C. After-School Activities
School attendance is expected for participation in after-school activities.

We value the educational experiences that are offered to our children. Therefore, we are concerned with 'students who have excessive absences, which negatively interfere with their learning process. We will notify you with any concerns regarding absences.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES

1. After being absent, each student should present a note to the office from a parent or guardian explaining the reason for the absence.
2. If a student needs to be dismissed from school, he/she-must report to the office before leaving.

MAKE-UP

2:45 to 3:30 Monday through Thursday is make-up time. Please schedule with your teacher.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCE RULE

1. A student who accumulates 5 unexcused absences in a semester course or 10 unexcused absences in a full year course will have his/her course credit withheld, pending an appeal. (For example, if a student misses period one 10 times, then his/her credit for that course will be withheld, pending an appeal.)
2. A grade of 65 or his/her earned grade for the course, whichever is lower, will be recorded.
3. If a student enrolls in school or in a course after the school year has begun, the number of unexcused absences will be adjusted consistent with the amount of time the student is enrolled in the course.
4. When a student accumulates 3 unexcused absences for a semester course, or 7 unexcused absences for a year-long course, the student and parent will be notified of the absences and reminded of the school's policy regarding absenteeism.
5. When a student accumulates 5 unexcused absences for a semester course, or 10 unexcused absences for a year-long course, the student and parent will be notified of the loss of credit and an appeals form will be provided.

APPEALS PROCESS

1. In order for a student to have his/her credit reinstated due to excessive absences, the student must file an "Attendance Appeals Form" to the assistant principal within 10 days of notification.
2. The "Attendance Appeals Form" will provide an opportunity for students to explain reasons for absences and attach proof. Based on the information provided, the assistant principal will either grant the appeal and reinstate credit, or date the appeal, and forward it to the Attendance Review Committee.
3. The Attendance Review Committee will consist of a guidance counselor, assistant principal/principal, school nurse, home school coordinator, and a classroom teacher.
4. The committee's goal will be to negotiate a collaborative plan for positive intervention by identifying behaviors and circumstances interfering with attendance. The student must take an active role in this planning session. Any plan adopted will be approved as a result of group consensus by the Attendance Review Committee, and may be written in the form of an Education Contract. This document will stipulate the condition leading up to the formal review, the objective(s) of the plan, the specific terms and expectations of the agreement for all participants, and a final acknowledgment section where participants will sign the contract indicating formal acceptance of the plan. Students successfully adhering to the terms of their education contract will be eligible to earn credit upon successful completion of their course of study. An appeal will not reinstate bonus incentives (Viking Card, bonus point, or final exam option).
5. Failure of the student to cooperate in the development or completion of an education contract will result in his/her appeal being denied.

ATTENDANCE INCENTIVES

1. Students who have perfect attendance will be issued a "Viking Card" which will be good for retail discounts.
 2. Any student with a passing grade for the fourth quarter and the year, who has three or less excused absences and no unexcused absences or suspensions for the year will have the option of not having to take his/her final exam.
- Please note: Students excused from the final exam for good attendance have the option of taking it and having it count if it helps their grade. Students participating in school-sponsored activities eg. band, sports, field trips, etc. are considered to be in attendance. Students may use up to (10) total days for any combination of college visits, job shadowing, or doctor's notes. These absences will not be held against students for attendance incentives.

TARDINESS

Students who are late to school without an acceptable excuse will be considered to be "Tardy Unexcused." Students will be allowed two unexcused tardies per semester without penalty. The third unexcused tardy will warrant a 45-minute detention and a fourth tardy will require the student to either serve one day on In-House Supervision or a Saturday Detention.

PASSES

You must have a pass when you are moving about the building. If you wish to check out of the building, report to the office for a dismissal pass.

LOCKERS

Lockers are the property of the school and may be searched at any time for health and safety reasons.

ACCIDENTS

Report all accidents to the teacher or advisor and office personnel. A prescribed procedure will be followed and parents will be notified.

NURSE

The school nurse is either in their office or on call every day. Students who are ill or injured should report to that office.

MEDICATION

If it becomes necessary for a student to use any form of medication at school, the medication must be in its original container and must be accompanied by prescription from a physician. All medication will be kept in the office of the school nurse.

LIBRARY

The library is open from 8:00 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. each day.

DANCES

All school policies are followed at dances. Once a student leaves a dance, no re-admittance will take place.

SELLING DRUGS

Any student caught selling drugs will be remanded to the proper authorities and suspended from school for up to ten (10) days, pending school committee action. Expulsion will be the recommendation made to the school committee.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE POLICY

- I. Chemical use or abuse at school or at any school function may result in:
 - A. A non-clinical assessment by a school professional.
 - B. Up to ten days suspension (in house preferred).
- II. Members of all organized clubs or teams must refrain from tobacco, alcohol, or drug use. Chemical use by any athletic team or club member will result in:
 - A. A non-clinical assessment by a school professional.
 - B. A thirty day suspension from the activity.
 - C. A second offense will require a sixty day suspension of activity.
- III. Students who self-refer will not be suspended from any activity, provided they follow the chemical health action plan outlined by the non-clinical assessment. Students may not self-refer to avoid punishment.
- IV. Students involved in the trafficking or furnishing of drugs or alcohol will appear before the school board for an expulsion hearing.

STUDENT SMOKING POLICY

- Smoking materials will not be allowed in the building.
1. Tobacco products and/or smoking materials (e.g. lighters), which are observed, will be confiscated from students on school grounds.
 2. Students found in possession of smoking materials in an area where smoking has recently occurred will be found in violation of the smoking policy.
 3. Students who violate Maine State Smoking Laws (e.g. possession of cigarettes under the age of 18) will be referred to the police.

VANDALISM

Any student vandalizing school property will be expected to pay for the damages and will receive a school consequence. If an item is damaged by accident, report it to office personnel.

WEAPONS

Any student who brings a weapon onto the school grounds or into the building will be referred to the school board for an expulsion hearing as required by Section 1302 of the Goals 2000: Educate America Act. A comprehensive policy is available upon request.

FIGHTING

After parent or guardian notification, students who are involved in a fight will be sent home for at least the remainder of the day. Students may receive up to 10 days suspension or school board hearing depending on the seriousness of the incident. Exception will be made if one person is clearly the victim and did nothing to provoke the fight.

HITTING A TEACHER OR STAFF MEMBER

Any student who hits a teacher or staff member will be suspended from school for a period of up to ten (10) days, pending school committee action. Expulsion will be recommended.

PROFANITY

The use of profanity by any student in any form, written or verbal, is prohibited. Included in the prohibition would be the use of obscene gestures, signs, pictures, or publications. The use of profanity directed to a teacher or staff member will result in a ten-day (10) suspension.

The use of profanity in the presence of a teacher or staff member will have one of the following consequences:

1. Warning
2. 45-Minute Detention
3. Saturday Detention

GYM SUITS OR UNIFORMS

Students are expected to have their gym clothes available for each class. Failure to do so will result in the following action taking place:

- * **1st Offense** Detention with teacher
- * **2nd Offense** Administrative conference
- * **3rd Offense** On-campus Supervision
- * **4th Offense** Withdrawal from class

This policy is on a semester basis.

PUBLIC DISPLAY OF AFFECTION

Public display of affection is considered inappropriate behavior on campus or at school-sponsored activities and will not be tolerated.

SKIPPING SCHOOL

- * **1st Offense** -Saturday detention and make up each class missed.
- * **2nd Offense** -Two Saturday detentions and make up time missed. Parent Conference.
- * **3rd Offense** -One week of on-campus supervision and a CST meeting.
- * **4th Offense** -Possible School Committee action at the discretion of the principal.

CELL PHONES/PAGERS

The use of cell phones is restricted to before homeroom, lunch period, and after 8th period. Use at any other time is prohibited and will result in a school consequence.

COMPUTER USE

Inappropriate use of the computer technology will result in suspension of Internet privileges. (See details in the Internet Acceptable Use Policy.)

HABITUAL OFFENDER/BLATANT DEFIANT BEHAVIOR

A student who is a habitual offender or who is blatantly defiant may be suspended from school for up to ten (10) days and may result in School Committee Action.

DETENTION

A student assigned to detention is expected to have study materials. Please cooperate with the teacher assigned to the detention period. Any student failing to arrive for an assigned detention will be assigned to one Saturday Detention.

ON-CAMPUS SUPERVISION

Students assigned to On-Campus Supervision will report to the office by 8:20 a.m. After an explanation of procedure, students will report to the In-House Room with assignments. It is expected that a student will spend the entire day completing assignments.

SATURDAY DETENTION

Saturday detention is from 8:00-11 :00 a.m. Students are required to bring books, paper, reading material, or pencils in order to work on various subjects.

1. No student will be allowed to enter after 8:00 a.m.
2. A quiet study hall atmosphere will prevail. No communication with other students will take place (oral, written or visual).
3. Five (5) minute breaks will be permitted at 9:25 and 10:25 a.m. At these times, the students will be restricted to the immediate corridor area. No other permits will be allowed.
4. Disciplinary problems or lack of willingness to study will result in further disciplinary action and forfeiture of all time served.
5. A student who fails to attend Saturday detention is subject to "two days of IN-HOUSE SUPERVISION followed by Saturday detention."

MISCONDUCT OFF SCHOOL GROUNDS

We reserve the right to discipline students for offenses that take place off school grounds and affect the operations, discipline, or general welfare of the school.

HARASSMENT POLICY

Every student is entitled to attend school in an environment free from harassment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, or handicap. Any student who feels that they are being subjected to harassment should contact a teacher, guidance counselor, administrator, or the School System Affirmative Action Officer (Mrs. Felch) to discuss the situation.

Students may also contact the Maine Human Rights Commission to file a formal complaint. Examples of harassment include but are not limited to: unwelcome sexual advances, gestures, comments, contact, threats, offensive jokes, ridicule, slurs, derogatory actions or remarks, derogatory or offensive posters, graffiti, or drawings.

Students are expected to adhere to the Harassment Policy. Failure to do so will result in one or more of the following disciplinary actions:

- * **1st Offense** will result in a warning and review of harassment guidelines and a call to the parent/guardian.
- * **2nd Offense** will result in a 45-minute detention and a call to the parent/guardian.
- * **3rd Offense** will result in a Saturday detention and a call to the parent/guardian.
- * **4th Offense** will result in suspension and a call to the parent/guardian.

Students who violate this policy may be referred to the proper authority and may receive suspension or school board action on the first incident depending on the seriousness of the infraction.

CARIBOU EQUAL EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY

The Caribou School Department does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, marital or parental status or handicap in its educational and employment programs and activities and is in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (45 CFR part 100), Title IX of the educational amendments of 1972 (45 CFR part 106), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (45 CFR part 104) and the Americans Disabilities Act of 1990.

DRESS CODE

Caribou High School takes great pride in their students and school community. The responsibility of student dress falls within the realm of parents and their children. The value of individual choice in the selection of appropriate clothing is also considered. However, in order to ensure that all students have the opportunity to learn in an environment safe and free from distractions, the following areas of appropriate dress, attire and grooming are addressed in relation to our school philosophy. Students will not wear clothing that is disruptive, immodest, extreme and unsafe that interrupts the educational atmosphere of our school.

Hats/hoods are not to be worn from the time homeroom starts until school is dismissed for the day. Students will wear clothing that covers shoulders, chest, back and midriff, and is no less than mid-thigh in length.

Undergarments will not show at any time. Any apparel that a student wears or has in their possession that is deemed unsafe will be removed. Footwear will be worn at all times. Heavy outdoor clothing will not be worn in the classroom. Any clothing or jewelry that, by word, illustration, symbol or innuendo which promotes drugs, alcohol, tobacco products, sexual themes, or violent acts is prohibited. *If in doubt regarding an article of clothing meeting the dress code, please do not wear it.*

Any student in violation of this code will be notified and requested to change their apparel before reentry into class. A parent conference will be held when deemed necessary. Repeated offences may result in suspension.

This policy will be applied during the school day and at any sanctioned activities or events.

Special events may warrant fashionable attire, which conflicts with this dress code. Administration will inform students as to when fashionable attire may be worn.

Application and interpretation of this policy will be determined at the discretion of the administration.
